

## We know her as a movie star, style icon and America's sweetheart – but who's the real Cameron Diaz? The actress, who turns 30 this month, talks to Gill Pringle about boyfriends, gap years and growing up.

n the face of it, the title of Cameron Diaz's latest film, The Sweetest Thing, couldn't be more apt. Diaz is no diva – the worst the tabloids can find to say about her is that her skin is prone to breakouts. Actors and directors queue up to work with her; fashion editors coo over her confident style. And who could resist that smile, almost wider than the face it rarely leaves?

But like America's other sweetheart, Julia Roberts, scoring \$20 million-plus a movie doesn't happen just because you're nice. What seems to have been an easy route into acting for Diaz has actually been hard graft: since her debut in 1994's *The Mask*, she's managed to cram in up to three films a year.

Yet, turning 30 this month, Diaz's priorities seem to have shifted. She's just taken

a year off and wants another extended break after she wraps *Charlie's Angels 2*. When we meet, she is still mid 'gap year' – and it shows. Positively glowing with wellbeing, she's enviably stylish in midriff-baring black drawstring trousers and a loose white cotton shirt. Her hair is scraped back into a pony tail, and she wears little make-up.

Most intriguingly, on the third finger of her right hand is a distractingly sparkly diamond ring. You can't help but wonder if it lives mostly on her left hand, but she talks only vaguely about her three-year relationship with *Panic Room* actor Jared Leto, mainly because she regrets how open she was about former flame Matt Dillon – the magazine covers they posed for together and their public protestations of love.
